
"The Creator" blessings..."

Just before the last battle at Batoche, Saskatchewan (then part of the North West Territories), on May 6, 1885, Louis Riel stated, *"Yes, I have done my duty. During my life I have aimed at practical results. I hope that after my death, my spirit will bring practical results. All that I have done and risked...rested certainly on the conviction that I was called upon to do something for my country. I know that through the grace of God, I am the founder of Manitoba."*

These historic words are now entrenched right in the historical/cultural space at the **Niverville Museum**, next to the **Niverville High School**, and close to the site that will house a **Métis Red River Cart** that will be displayed to honour the role of the Métis in the history of the land within the **Hanover School Division**.

"I was called upon to do something for my country." All that I have done and risked...rested certainly on the conviction that I was called upon to do something for my country. I know that through the grace of God, I am the founder of Manitoba.

— Louis Riel, 1885. First Member of Parliament for the Provencher Constituency.



By Oral Tradition, this statement is attributed to Louis Riel: "My people will sleep for one hundred years, but when they awake, <u>it will be the artists who give them their spirit back</u>." In 1885, shortly before his untimely death, he stated, "I have always believed that, as I have acted honestly, the time will come when the people of Canada will see and acknowledge it." Just before his execution, he declared, "In a little while, it will be over. We may fail, but the rights for which we contend will not die."
